

a family daily and then orally tell the story of the Old Testament over and over again. This was considered their oral tradition. This oral tradition was their main way of knowing the Scriptures because very few people back then were able to read or write. Their sharing of the stories of the Bible by the word of mouth for many years, decades, and even centuries was done before the Scripture stories were actually written down. It is amazing how their oral tradition was so consistent, exact, and without error. It must have been God's Spirit that transmitted and overseen their oral tradition that made it so effective.

A big part of their oral tradition must have been their attentive listening to each Bible story. We too as disciples are called to be attentive listeners to the Sacred Scriptures. By that I mean that we cannot allow God's message to go in one ear and out the other, but we should focus on hearing and absorbing each and every word that God spoke and later had written down as Sacred Scriptures. This attentive listening is an important prerequisite for our learning and our understanding who God truly is. So, what enters an attentive listener's ears certainly needs to be absorbed by their mind, and then ultimately the attentive listener needs to allow God's words to give direction to their life.

As disciples of Jesus Christ, we too are called to be attentive listeners just like the Hebrew's oral tradition of their Old Testament stories. Being attentive listeners to the Sacred Scriptures will provide us direction to our lives which is so desperately needed in today's society.

Scripture Reading: James 2:1-10, (11-13), 14-17

If opportunity doesn't knock, build a door. —Milton Berle

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William Carey was highly educated and blessed with impressive linguistic skills. He was also a Christian, and while in India, he became passionate about making translations of the Bible in Bengali, Sanskrit and other languages and dialects. The tedium and stress of translation and the creation of dictionaries was enormous. The time required was unthinkable. Years, in fact.

And then something horrible happened. One spring day, whilst he was away from his station, a fire broke out, and all his work and that of his colleagues went up in flames. Everything Carey had accomplished including the manuscripts, grammars, dictionaries, buildings, printing presses and especially the Bibles — all in smoke and ashes. According to one source, "among the losses were many irreplaceable manuscripts, including much of Carey's translation of Sanskrit literature and a polyglot dictionary of Sanskrit and related languages, which would have been a seminal philological work had it been completed."

Can you imagine how Carey's staff must have dreaded Carey's return? They would need to explain how this had happened — how they had allowed this to happen!

Carey returned, and he was led to the site of the disaster. He knelt amid the smoking pile of rubble and thanked God that he still had strength enough to start over. Without a word of despair or anger, he immediately began to work.

Years later, he had not only replicated his earlier work, but he had also done a better job of it. His dictionaries, grammar books and translations of the Bible far surpassed the first effort.

This tragedy happened in 1812, more than 200 years ago. Thanks to William Carey's patience and perseverance, he brought the Bible to untold millions of the Indian subcontinent.

Have you ever faced crushing disappointment — the kind of setback that sucks the wind out of your lungs and causes your heart to flutter in despair? One such story is the tale of the ancient patriarch Job who suffered the loss of everything — his children, his friends and all of his material wealth. He even suffered the loss of his health, and he was in danger of losing his faith in God.

This is the danger of adversity: since we usually need someone or something to blame, we often turn our anger on God. Job did. But he recovered to assert that through it all he had learned that his Redeemer lived and that he was learning to trust in God.

Prayer: In my dark nights of the soul, let me still sense your presence. Amen.



Scripture Reading: James 3:1-12

We must be big enough to admit our mistakes, smart enough to profit from them, and strong enough to correct them. —John C. Maxwell (adapted)



Today, the subject is the humble eraser. Yes, that little red, rubbery knob that's affixed to the top of a pencil. Of course, not all erasers are *pencil* erasers. Whereas some erasers are great for removing errant pencil marks, others are made especially for *pen or ink* mistakes.

In life, we need literal erasers to correct errors. But erasers have strong allegorical applications as well, and they remind us of the positive uses of erasers.

For example, an artist in the process of creating something beautiful — a piano concerto, a landscape painting, a drawing, etc. — uses erasers or some other tools, to shape, modify or mold their creations, selectively removing lines, notes, pigments or shades to bring their vision to life. The eraser becomes a tool of precision, enabling these creative souls to achieve intricate details and subtle nuances in their work. An eraser is not just an instrument for undoing or correcting a problem; it is also a medium for creative expression.

But sometimes, erasers serve as *correctors*. They exist to expunge unexpected and unwelcome errors. In today's Bible reading, the apostle James worries about the power of the tongue to injure the feelings of others. The tongue is powerful, and we are prone to saying things we regret, and unfortunately, once the words are out, they are hard to recall!

That's why, when we have misspoken, the best eraser is the remedy of confession and apology. Absent these "erasures," this page of our lives is going to be full of unsightly stains.

So, the eraser is a symbol of *second chances*. In the world of pencils and erasers, every mistake is an opportunity to make it right. The eraser, with its simple yet powerful function, embodies the concept of redemption in the ebb and flow of our everyday lives. It reminds us that errors are not necessarily permanent, but rather, they can be forgiven and erased by the greatest eraser of all time, the work of Christ on the cross.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, thank you for this reminder of the importance of watching how I use my words. Encourage me to take care of the mistakes I make. In your name. Amen.

Jesus' words are a game changer. The GOATS among us are the servants among us. Of all the life skills we need to learn, how to be a servant is the most important.

Prayer: Make me a blessing, O Lord, as I live to serve others. In your name. Amen.



Here's a story that gives us the chance to ask ourselves if we're wasting time by complaining.


